Weeks 1 & 3: FUN WITH FESTIVALS!

June 5-9 & June 19-23 Kids learn about Japanese festivals and folk dances, and make and learn to play their own taiko drum. Design a Japanese tenugui towel, and uchiwa festival fan.

Weeks 2 & 4: BRUSH STROKES, MANGA & ANIME!

June 12-16 & June 26-30 Inspired by Tibetan mandalas, kids create their own colorful mandala using chalk. Learn traditional Japanese calligraphy, compose haiku, learn how to draw and paint manga using Japanese pen brushes, then with an anime app they make their manga come alive!
